

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - UPDATE

In the previous newsletter, the need for a Neighbourhood Plan was explained. The Parish Council applied for the designation of Neighbourhood Area and this was subject to consultation in May/June. This area was to cover Loggerheads & Ashley and part of the rural area of the parish. The results of that consultation have been reviewed with the Borough Council and included proposals to both reduce the area and increase it. The Councils have agreed that it would be more appropriate to include the whole parish in the designated area so have made a new application which will be subject to consultation from 27 July until 24 August.
